Statement of accounting policies

For the year ended 31 December 2016

Basis of preparation

Arts Access Aotearoa has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income tax

Arts Access Aotearoa is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax, having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions. Section CW41 and 42 of the Income Tax Act 2007 exempt income tax on an organisation registered with the Charities Commission, and applying income to its charitable purposes. The Trust has income tax exemption and charitable status through its registration with the Charities Commission on the 30 June 2008 (CC 33533).

Bank accounts and cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Changes in accounting policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies during the financial year (last year - nil).

Fixed assets

Fixed assets, other than land, are recorded at cost, less accumulated depreciation.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been calculated on a straight line basis over the estimated useful life of the assets.

Debtors

Debtors have been recorded at their net realisable value.

Revenue recognition

Income is recognised when invoiced, or receipted except where income is received in advance. Income in Advance is stated as a current liability where the funds have not yet been expended, according to the authorised purpose, and those funds would be required to be repaid to the funder.
