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What is this document about?



This Easy Read document is about looking for disabled people to be facilitators for accessibility responsiveness training.



A **facilitator** is someone who leads a training group.



Here accessibility responsiveness training is teaching people about what disabled people need so they can be involved in the arts.











The arts include things like:

- painting
- writing
- dancing
- making or playing music
- weaving
- wood carving
- making plays
- making TV shows
- making films.

- mental health communities.




In this document Arts Access

An **expression of interest** is officially saying you would like to do something.

What are Arts Access Aotearoa doing?



Deaf



Arts Access Aotearoa are doing a **pilot project** so more people can be part of the arts including:

- Deaf people
- disabled people.




A **pilot project** is a small project that tests out how something might work.









The project will do this for these Deaf or disabled people who:

- make art like:
 - o artists
 - o dancers
 - o writers
- are arts workers
- enjoy the arts.

Who do Arts Access Aotearoa want?



Arts Access Aotearoa are looking for people from Aotearoa New Zealand to lead their responsiveness training who are:



- Deaf
- disabled.



They want different types of people.



You do not need to have been a facilitator before.



If you have been a facilitator before that would be helpful.

What will happen in the training?



You will learn how to be a facilitator who can lead accessibility responsiveness training in the arts.



Arts Access Aotearoa will pay for:

- you to learn to be a facilitator
- any support you need to do the training



 you to lead the responsiveness training workshops.



The training will include:

- how to be a facilitator
- learning about what Arts Access
 Aotearoa want you to do
- how you can use what you know about being:
 - disabled
 - o in the arts.



There might be more work after the pilot project is finished.



The pilot project runs from July to August 2024.

How to apply for the training

- making a New Zealand Sign Language / NZSL video

You can also answer the questions by:

- making:
 - o an audio file
 - o a video file
- filling in a survey.



Word document



You can type your answers in a Word document.



After you have finished the Word document send it by **email** to:

NZSL video

You can record a video of you answering the questions in New Zealand Sign Language / NZSL.



When you have finished the video send it to Arts Access Aotearoa using a file transfer application.



File transfer applications are computer programs that let you send a big file over the internet.



You might want someone to support you to use one of these computer programs.



The file transfer applications you can use are:

- Dropbox
- WeTransfer.

Phone or Zoom



Arts Access Aotearoa can record you answering the questions:

Zoom is a way of talking by video over the internet.




