MNZ made a great achievement in May with our first conference since 2001. Our leaders travelled to Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland from every corner of Aotearoa for two days of kōrero and learning on immigration policy, Tiriti-based population strategy, cultural infrastructure, and the devastating and pervasive effects of colonialism.

Over the two days we saw four discussion panels featuring eminent community leaders, advocates, academics, and public servants, as well as an interview with then Immigration Minister Michael Wood, and a political panel with MPs for the Labour, National, and Green parties.



The first panel featured Lupematasila Misatauveve Dr Melani Anae, Tā Mark Solomon, Harry Tam, and Dr Ganesh Nana discussing immigration policy. The panel was facilitated by

Professor David MacDonald.

Then Minister for Immigration Michael Wood, interviewed by Professor David MacDonald.



The second panel was facilitated by Professor James Liu and featured Butch Bradley, Dr Negar Partow, Meng Foon and Pancha Narayanan discussing cultural infrastructure.





Tina Ngata discussed the devastating and pervasive effects of colonialism ingrained in the New Zealand way of life, followed by reflections from Chief Human Rights Commissioner Paul Hunt.



Sally Clarkson from the Ministry of Social Development and NZ Police Superintendent Rakesh Naidoo provided valuable perspective on the incorporation and implementation of change in government departments.



Sunday's session concluded with a political forum featuring Vanushi Walters from the Labour Party, Melissa Lee from the National Party, and Ricardo Menéndez March from the Greens.

National Action Plan Against Racism

MNZ has embarked on a mission to help guide communities to develop local action plans against racism, completing two pilot NAPAR sessions this year: Porirua in June, and Oamaru in July.



Covid-19 Vaccine Booster Drive

July 2023 saw the rollout of two successful Covid-19 Vaccination uptake campaign events in the regions: Gisborne on Sunday the 2nd and Invercargill on Saturday the 29th. MNZ President Pancha Narayanan joined MNZ Treasurer and Covid-19 Campaign Coordinator Prem Singh at both events.
