Suffrage Day - 19 September 2020

'New Zealand women won the right to vote when the Electoral Act 1893 passed on the 19th of September 1893. This paved the way for additional liberal reforms that earned New Zealand the reputation as the 'social laboratory of the world'. These reforms included a universal accident compensation scheme, a 48-hour working week, and welfare protection for workers, children and the elderly.

To highlight the work of three suffragists who were instrumental in securing the vote for women. From 18 September to 10 October 2020 a free Suffragist display featuring Meri Te Tai Mangakāhia, Kate Sheppard and Mary Ann Müller have been set up in the foyer at the National Library of New Zealand in Wellington.

Why is a white ribbon worn, internationally, on 25 November?

I was reading the latest issue of the Heritage New Zealand magazine and read that not only was Kate Sheppard the public face of our suffragette movement but she was also head of the Women's Christian Temperance Union in NZ. 1895 she became the first editor of their newspaper 'The White Ribbon'. The paper was later renamed The New Zealand White Ribbon Digest.

The WCTU called the paper 'The White Ribbon' because the white ribbon was the symbol of the suffrage movement. The original WCTU had adopted a white ribbon <u>bow</u> as a symbol of their 'purity of purpose' for God, Home, and Humanity. Today the white ribbon remembrance <u>loop</u> has become the symbol of anti-violence against women, safe motherhood, and causes and ideals related to women.

It's interesting to read that since 1874 in Ohio, and 1885 in NZ, some of the WTCU's primary objectives still include:

- protection of women and children at home and work
- shelters for abused women and children
- stiffer penalties for sexual crimes against girls and women
- passive demonstrations and world peace

Many members will already know that little précis but until now I had no real sense of how great a role we play in nearly 150 years of women's history.







History of the 25 November Day (White Ribbon Day)

The concept of violence against women as a form of discrimination and a human rights violation - first introduced by the global women's rights movement - has progressively gained acceptance at the international level since the 1990s.



In 1992, the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) Committee adopted its trailblazing General Recommendation No. 19, thereby establishing that gender-based violence was a form of discrimination against women and linking the achievement of gender equality to the eradication of violence against women, and vice versa.

The United Nations General Assembly Declaration on the Elimination of Violence against Women, adopted a year later in 1993, specified the types and forms of violence against women and the contexts in which it occurs. In this context, in 1999 the United Nations General Assembly <u>designated 25 November</u> as the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, and invited governments, international organizations and NGOs to organize on that day activities designed to raise public awareness of the problem. Through out the world on this day people wear a white ribbon to show that they do not condone violence towards women. White Ribbon Day celebrates the many men willing to show leadership and commitment to promoting safe, healthy relationships within families and encourages men to challenge each other on attitudes and behaviour that are abusive.



Zonta Says No is a International campaign

During the 16 Days of Activism, 25 November-10 December, all Zonta clubs and districts are encouraged to take part in the Zonta Says NO to Violence Against Women campaign and to take local, national and international actions to influence the making and implementation of laws, as well as changing gender-based attitudes and behaviors to end violence against women

In this country most violence by men against women takes place in the home – with an average of 14 women a year killed by their partners or ex-partners. Each year there are over 3,500 convictions recorded against men for assaults on women and one in five women will experience sexual assault or sexual interference at some point in their lives.

- On 25th November, a promotional literature awareness table will be set up New World, Porirua, and club members will be handing out White Ribbon information and orange balloons, roster for 4 hours.
