
Principles of developing a regional structure.

- Democratically elected Regional Council with supporting committees and area leaders.
- Area leaders would be elected by the 10-25 clubs they would support.
- Any Rotarian and Rotaractor can nominate self or others for all roles.
- Representation is important geography, gender etc.
- Collect the best resources from around Zone 8 to help and support every club.
- 2-4 year terms.








