Valedictory Commentary

It seems appropriate to have the opportunity to say some wise words when you choose to leave Rotary. Here are some such words from Wendy Betteridge:

In 1972 (when was that?) I was approached by a friend who had become pregnant in the middle of the

school year and couldn't complete the summer term. The principal had asked her to find someone to replace her and although she knew I wasn't a teacher, I was a qualified hockey and tennis coach. The principal employed me on the basis that I couldn't do any work with the students in the gym.

One morning I had a group of students on the tennis courts and soon noticed that one girl was being shunned, ignored, and ostracized by the other students. As I saw her attempt to hit a ball, there was some derision when she missed. I set



some exercises for the other students to work on and moved over to the girl. To cut a long story short, I showed her how to take her racquet back and swing it forward to my count. It was then my responsibility to make sure that I bounced the ball in exactly the right place so that it contacted the middle of her racquet as she swung.

She didn't just hit one ball – she hit every ball and the look on her face was one of astonishment and joy. She might never have hit a ball again, but in that moment, she was a star and many of the other students gathered round – there were even a few hugs.

In my thirty years with Plimmerton Rotary, I have often watched with great pleasure as some new members have embraced their own magnificence and grown before our very eyes. Many join the club, already brimming with confidence and the desire to make a difference. Some exude a modicum of self-doubt, and it has been those whose growth and development has filled me with excitement and pride. I'm aware that I was one of the latter variety and owe a great debt of gratitude to the club for giving me so many wonderful opportunities to serve and to grow.

As I stand down, I offer my sincere thanks for those opportunities and wish the club all the very best for its future.

The last 7 editions of the event have been an overwhelming success. More than 150 participants from 18 different countries have attended the event and have had wonderful experiences to take back home.

The proceeds from this event go to The Rotary Foundation. We have contributed close to \$150,000 to TRF from the last 7 editions.

This year's event will be held from 5th to 20th January 2024. The 15 days event will start-off from Udaipur (India) and can either be a motorcycle ride, or a four-wheeler drive.
