After lunch we were entertained with a short video of Judi's mum, Helen Mills telling us all about the time she was in the WAAF - she is now 94 year and is the last living WAAF.



In 1942 at the age of 18, and at the height of the war, Helen joined the WAAF (Women's Auxiliary Air Force). Initially posted to Bridgnorth in Shropshire she received her uniform and some basic training. On completion she was then posted to Morecambe in Lancashire where she had her initial training and 'passed out'. She had a choice of job and decided to become a Clerk SD or Plotter using RDF (Radio Direction Finding) which was done using a large map and instructions given over a headset. She was posted to the Sector Airfield of RAF Fighter Command of 11 Group at Hornchurch. This was in the south of England and was in the thick of all the action including the Battle of Britain. Later she was then posted to the Observation Room of RAF Fighter Command's 11 Group HQ at Uxbridge, which was overseen by Air Vice-Marshal Keith Park. The Obs. Room was underground in a bunker and was accessed by 76 steps and everyone, no matter how important, had to climb up and down, there was no lift! The VIP's who visited included King George VI, Churchill and Eisenhower.

The Venus Symbol – Empower and Evolve

The symbol for "woman" or "female" was named after the Goddess Venus and has become the symbol denoting all things female. The circle, or in our case the wheel, denotes the inclusive nature of our organisation. Here there is no exclusion. All welcome, and ever-expanding

The cross (added in the 16th century) rests beneath the womb (represented by the circle in the Venus symbol). The location of the cross under the circle indicates all are birthed from an inclusive, loving womb.

On the top half we feel the openness and inclusivity (circle). Yet, on the lower half we experience a narrowing, or a "coming to the crux." Visually you can see opening and closing, beginnings and endings, in this symbol.

Through the symbol and the theme there is an acknowledgement of the great need for women to change the world through their own empowerment and evolution.

DISTRICT MEETING

This year we celebrate 125 years of Women's Suffrage and this set the theme for the meeting. Marie opened the meeting and the Friendship Candle was lit. She spoke to us about how special these meetings are, getting together and the level of commitment especially from our older members.



Our guest speaker was Dr Anne Else who is a writer, feminist and academic. She spoke about the update of a book first published in 1993 - "Women Together: a history of Women's organisations in New Zealand. The review of the original will celebrate 125 years of Women's Suffrage.

The Wellington Club produced a scrumptious lunch serving us with their "Votes for Women" aprons.











After lunch Eunice Chivers from the Ruel Foundation spoke to us of the work done in the Philippines at their orphanage where the little children are brought back to good health before their operations to repair hair lips and cleft palates. She also showed a short video of the children living in the orphanage. Jeanette Townsend, our OIS then presented her with a cheque for \$3,000+ (some clubs had donated direct) which she was very grateful for as this would mean more smiles on more little faces.

Her birth mother is only a child herself, who due to poverty and sexual abuse lost her childhood prematurely, was abandoned by her family and left to deal with the physical and emotional pain of rape and childbirth alone! However, this is only the beginning of a transformational life story for Precious and her mum.

Thankfully one of the police personnel, involved in the rape case formed a close bond with Precious's mum and took her into her own home offering safety, security and hope! This amazing police woman has now applied for a foster care license so that she can continue to care for this young girl to ensure she is educated, loved and given life opportunities that she wouldn't have otherwise had available to her. We are so grateful that this incredible lady reached out to make a significant difference to one young girl in desperate need of love. Precious is thriving with us and her case is being assessed for possible future adoption. Both Precious and her mum have been given hope for a much better future. Thank you to all our sponsors and donors for making it possible for us to share these exciting life changing stories - one smile at a time! "

It was a pleasure and an easy way to help our local community.

Essentially the children are aged from 3 to 5 years but there is now a need to cater for 2-year olds. Our committee has decided that some of the money from our Charity Account go towards story books and clothing and a monthly fruit parcel. Members continue to contribute individually with books and craft materials. This month, October, our members made up a collection of personal items for mothers who cannot afford the essentials such as shampoo, conditioner and sanitary products

FOSTER HOPE

Mention had been made by a few clubs at both a District Meeting and an AGM of Foster Hope. Enquiries locally resulted in our club finding a lady who acts as the local agent for this charity.

As many Inner Wheel members know, Foster Hope was established to supply items for children who are placed in foster care often with short notice resulting in them arriving without any possessions particularly clothing.

The dolls are delivered to the children's ward and are used by doctors and nurses to indicate to children what treatment they will be receiving. The children are encouraged to decorate the dolls. This year we excelled ourselves and completed 280 dolls

This year we walked around the streets close to a Retirement Village which has an excellent café attached which is open to the public. With the area also being residential, while we walked along we got the benefit of seeing the start of spring flowering.

SOUTH WAIRARAPA

Our year to date has focussed mainly on our theme - Caring for Women and Girls, but also our own theme of Charity Begins at Home while increasing International Understanding.

Our monthly Knit and Natter group made in excess of 150 singlets and beanies for babies and small children in an orphanage in Botswana. These were taken by plane as hand luggage and the passengers were so intrigued the singlets were all passed around with great appreciation from everyone.







We continued our knitting evenings and provided our local Maori and Pacific Island Health Centre (Whaiora) with mire knitted garments and cot blankets. Louis Witbooi, one of the Clinical Directors came and spoke to our group about the work they do particularly with the impoverished families in the Wairarapa. We thanked him with a car load of food, linen and knitted goods for the mothers and children from the Centre.

To celebrate our 25th Anniversary we donated 12 native trees and a brass plaque to the Memorial Bush in Greytown. We also had a speaker from The Lions Club who have been raising money to purchase an electric trishaw for Greytown. This project has been supported by all groups in our community to give older people the opportunity to be taken out for a ride, to improve their quality of life and give them new experiences.

Following a spate of burglaries in Greytown we invited Area Commander Scott Miller to talk about our personal and home security and the possibility of setting up Neighbourhood Watch groups. A number of our members are older women, living on their own, who can feel vulnerable. He gave us some very valuable tips about protecting ourselves including the need to have a lockable room inside our homes in which we can keep safe if there is an intruder or home invasion.

We had the girls who we supported to go to Outward Bound last year, come and speak of the life changing experience the course had given them. This was a huge project last year and it was very gratifying to have them come and talk to us. We have also sent hundreds of new and good used bras to the women in the Solomon Islands.

We had a very interesting talk about our cultural heritage in the form of our Greytown Little Theatre which is entering into a new stage of development with the building of a new purpose-built theatre to replace the present earthquake damaged premises. Little Theatre has been operating for over 190 years and South Wairarapa Inner Wheel have had a close association with them. We look forward to their reopening and enjoying shared evenings of local talent.

Two of our members plus a Rotarian visited Raratonga where they attended a Rotary meeting and talked about Inner Wheel and what our objects are. Those present knew nothing about our clubs and were very interested. An excellent opportunity to promote our organisation.



Finally, we enjoyed entertaining Sheila Woods, Past President of Dublin Inner Wheel. A group of us took her out to High Tea in Masterton. She was very interested in our club and we enjoyed sharing experiences with her.



TAWA

The Inner Wheel club of Tawa has had a busy beginning to the year with the first meeting in July one in which President Carolyn outlined plans for the 2018/2019 year. These were developed with an agreed vision in mind - Working with our local community, increase membership, raise Inner Wheel Profile.



Our club was privileged to be the first in the District to be visited by District Chairman Marie Gillies.

She was welcomed warmly with a request to open the meeting with the lighting of the candle before inducting two new members. We were delighted to be able to present Marie with a cheque towards the District's Service Project – 'The Ruel project'. She was accompanied by her father Robbie Kerr and introduced by grandfather Bruce Murray (past Principal Tawa College). Grandmother Shona Murray, another iconic Tawa figure, came to support and act as photographer. Table decorations were created and donated by the Twisted Willow Florist in Tawa taking on a silver fern theme with spring flowers and painted silver ferns. Cricket Wellington donated a cricket bat which Amelia signed and was auctioned with these funds going towards the clubs identified service projects.





In MasterChef there are always staples under the bench and whilst the activities outlined above were taking place so were our club staples. Knitted peggy squares continued for rug making to be donated to Women's Refuge; hospital bags sewn, filled and delivered to the hospital; plants and pants support the projects at Arohata prison; Beanies knitted for Pregnancy help; Foster hope received contributions of pyjamas; catering for the Tawa men's choir continued each month and friendship groups met for coffee mid-week and a sip and chat on a Saturday. Both events are run once a month.
