#### ANGEL TREE

A Big Thank you to all the ladies who took a card from the Angel Tree. Will you please bring along your gift to out next meeting on the 15th November. The gifts should be UNWRAPPED and in a carrier bag with the tag attached.

Statistics show that children of prisoners are nine and a half times more likely to offend than their peers, so Prison Fellowship run Angel Tree as part of a programme to journey with these children and their families to make a difference and see these statistics reduced. Children who maintain a relationship with their incarcerated parent(s) have an improved emotional response to the incarceration, which results in reduced truancy and better education results.

- The children pay for crimes they didn't commit.
- They grieve the loss of the parent and are left dealing with abandonment.
- They live with judgement, shame, bullying.
- They live with a care giver who is grieving and coping with judgement and shame themselves, as well as perhaps reduced finances for the home.
- Sometimes these children have to relocate.
- Maintaining a relationship with their parent inside isn't easy, about 50% of these families don't live in the same region as the prison and many of those that do have transport issues.

The Christmas gift given by Angel Tree is the first step in improving their response to the incarceration and building a relationship with them. From this comes more contact with the child and family by way of camps, Christmas dinner, family events and interventions such as counselling services. Therefore the gift opens the door to a deeper and more relevant relationship. It is only out of relationship that Prison Fellowship can provide the children and families with a foundation of love from which to move forward."

#### Garden Trail Showcases Gardens Around Pauatahanui for Te Ara Piko Pathway Development

The Garden Trail last year was a great success and with 15 gardens on show this year (10 of which are new to the day). One of Pauatahanui's premier events is expected to be even better. The day provides an opportunity to explore a unique mix of rural and urban gardens at a pace and order that suits you.

An exciting change for 2016 is the ability to plan your itinerary before the day as the ticket you purchase is now the map and garden booklet. This makes the day a whole lot easier as you have no last minute decisions to make on which gardens to visit and the order.

This is a Plimmerton Inner Wheel and Rotary partnership with all of the ticket proceeds going to the development of the Te Ara Piko Pathway. Last year this amounted to \$26,000 and went a long way towards the significant funding sum Rotary is seeking to complete the Motukaraka Point to Camborne section of the Pathway. The Te Ara Piko Pathway is a joint Porirua City Council and Plimmerton Rotary project.
