

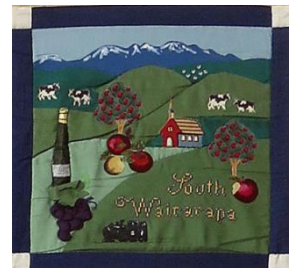
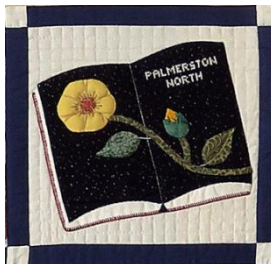

Auckland Conference 2019

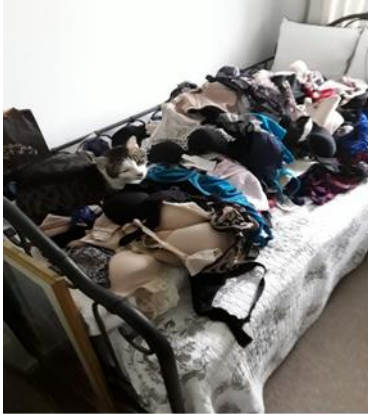

We had interesting speakers and fantastic entertainment.

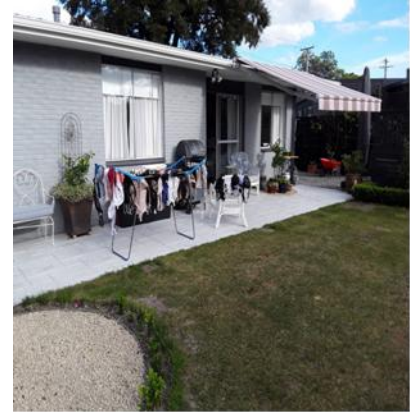
SOUTHERN WAIRARAPA

Bras 'n' Cars in Prison - A True Story

South Wairarapa Inner Wheel has spent hours collecting, laundering, sorting and delivering bras to the needy. It is amazing how many women have gone without this, to some of us, vital undergarment. Over the years we have sent hundreds to the Solomon Islands, Women's Refuge, and this year it was decided to take around 100 to the Arohata Prison at Remutaka Prison, Wellington.



As we had attended District Assembly at Whitby, reputedly not far from the prison, we thought we'd deliver them the same day. Our ISO Team for this 'operation' was Liz, Kathleen and me. It turned out to be a chapter of incidents, or perhaps 'accidents' is a better word.



Our driver, Liz, who was showing off the new car she'd owned for just a week, headed out to the parked car straight after the meeting. Her key didn't seem to work properly to open the driver's door.

"Er.... That's my vehicle," an elderly gentleman advised in a very polite and understanding manner. Embarrassed, Liz successfully unlocked her smaller car parked immediately in front of the gentleman's car. His was the same size and colour as her previous vehicle. So, that sorted, it was off to the prison we went.

Liz had lived in the Wellington region for a long time and had a route all planned on roads she knew. Unfortunately part of that route had lots of red cones and a sign saying "Closed Except for Local Residents." Liz followed her predetermined route (and she *had* been a local) until we came to a dead end. After executing a four point turn we then followed the detour.

Liz almost turned down a road to the Live Ammunition Range, as we approached the prison, aka to us, the "Firing Squad". We found the correct street and looked for the gate which was supposed to be "just after an old house". However, there were three roads to choose from, the low road, the middle road and the high road. We chose the low road, tiki toured and reversed here and there, and found no sign of a gate. Finally we saw a man who told us it was ok to go down an even lower road with lots of 'No Admittance' signs. Kathleen was becoming quite perturbed by this time. She did not want her photo taken there. She'd never been to a prison and decided to hide behind her sunglasses.

"Perhaps I should put my scarf around my face" she suggested.

"Kathleen, don't" I insisted, remembering that New Zealand was on high security alert and we were in a place where suspicious looking wanderers would be dealt with forthwith.

We found a building with a door rather than a gate and a man about to enter. He signalled for us to go up the hill. I hopped out for directions, and on my return to the car saw Liz backing away. Having no inclination to stay outside the men's prison I indicated so quite unambiguously. Just after I climbed in a Security man in a jeep truck and trailer drove alongside.

"Are you lost?" he asked. Quite some detective, we thought.

By this time Kathleen had removed her glasses. We explained that we had boxes of bras to take to the gate of the women's prison. Leaning forward from the back seat Kathleen piped up, "Perhaps you might like to deliver them for us?" she asked. Well, you should have seen his face. No verbal refusal was necessary. Anyway, he offered to lead us there and patiently waited while Liz parked the car outside the gate in that bemused way men can have in such situations. By this time Kathleen, having now lost almost all her inhibitions, was outside the car helping direct Liz into the carpark. Being raised to always be polite she made polite small talk to the Security man.

"Isn't it nice and peaceful here," she commented, admiring the pukeko grazing nearby. "Not always" was his reply. He directed us to the gate and we finally delivered the bras, much to the delight of the Corrections Officer. We toddled off home, laughing like teenagers. Kathleen later realised she had had her badge on when speaking to the Security man! So much for anonymity!

Cobblestones Museum's new exhibition, "38 Sections, 38 Stores"

Our speaker at the March meeting was Annabelle O'Meara who told us about the new Cobblestones Exhibition which opened on 24 February called "38 Sections, 38 Stories". See photo below of the Research team at the opening, with Koumatua Nelson Rangī.



Annabelle became involved with the exhibition when it was intended to commemorate Greytown 100 years ago as well as to tell some stories of young men from the Wairarapa who left for WW1. Funding and perceived over-exposure to the WW1 days led to a changed focus. When Thomas Nieuwenhuis, a graduate from the Victoria University of Wellington Architecture department came to Cobblestones on a three month residency, he made an exquisite model of the Main Street in Greytown, which became a 'shot in the arm' for the Research Team. This cost \$3000 and was funded by the Cobblestones Trust Board. Some of the components of the impressive exhibition are as follows:

1. 38 illustrated summaries about each of the sections
2. Three large panels describing the Crown (1853 acquiring land from the mana whenua ... leading to the Small Farms Settlement. 1.5m acres left Maori hands, in 41 deeds in a payment of 23,500 pounds.
3. A projector shows 60 images of old Greytown.
4. Notes on the Exhibition, by Thomas and a Mihi, written in te reo Maori and English
5. Artwork by Tina Rae Carter of stylised rooftops with the Waiohine River on the floor.

Annabelle emphasised the significance of Papawai, reminding us that our history is not just after the European settlement but went back hundreds of years and beyond.

The second half of the Inner Wheel Year was time to review our goals and explore opportunities to help achieve these outcomes. Working alongside the local Salvation Army an idea to invite local groups to decorate tables with a Christmas theme and display in the Tawa mall Atrium became a reality in December. This event ran concurrently with the Tawa community Christmas parade and profits from the public voting, for their favourite table, went towards the Food Bank.

October the club was in the community once again with participation in 'Spring Into Tawa'; an annual local festival event. The service work undertaken by the club was displayed alongside information about Inner Wheel for the purpose of informing the public and possibly attracting new members.



In January and February planning began for our largest fundraiser – The Women's Health and Beauty Expo. Sponsorship from local businesses helped with seeding money and advertising. Look Good Feel Better, our National Project, was the recipient of funds raised. A speaker from the organisation opened the event and material about the support LGFB gives available through a specific display. Twenty plus exhibitors, displaying a wide range of goods and services, 100 plus attendees, spot raffles, spot prizes, nibbles and giveaways contributed to another very successful event.

Hospital bags, knitting blankets, the making of silky pillow and catering have continued as the club's mainstays of service.

An invitation to the Inner Wheel club of Plimmerton for indoor bowls and fellowship in May, delivering Mothers' Day flowers and collections for the food bank will complete another successful and busy year.

At the beginning of the Inner Wheel year the club discussed and agreed on outcomes the club would like to achieve. The members felt it was important to increase awareness of Inner Wheel as an organisation by having a presence in the community, at the same time contribute to the Tawa area through service and attract new members.

Our annual quiz night was held in August with funds going towards the local Tawa Community Patrol. This event involves members from outside the Inner Wheel family and is one activity which raises the organisations profile.

Invitations were sent to clubs and friends to attend the September monthly meeting with guest speaker Amelia Kerr – white Fern Cricketer known for her one-day limited overs score of 232. Amelia impressed those in attendance with her wisdom as she spoke about the way she manages a life of study with high- performance sport. Over 60 attendees participated in this special evening – an incredible role model displaying such humility and modesty.

September was a busy month with Walk and Talk on the 1st when we invited the Inner Wheel Club of Eastern Hutt to join us for coffee at The Quinn's Post Tavern and walked to Golders Cottage, one of Upper Hutt's earliest pioneer cottages, built in 1876.

On Daffodil Day several of our members helped to staff the Daffodil Day shop which was well supported by the public and by the Cancer Society.

When Josie Jamieson, visited from the Inner Wheel Club of Gosnells, Western Australia Ethel Gray put on a luncheon. In March this year we were visited by another member of that club, Margaret Redfern who was visiting her sister who lives in Upper Hutt.

2018-19 has been a busy year. In August we collected 51 pairs of new/second hand shoes and 35 pairs of socks. These were given to a school in Newtown, Wellington. The children were so excited to be given socks and shoes. There were even enough shoes to keep some in reserve for the future.

We have continued to have "sewing bees" making hygienic items for women and every one of these items is received with heartfelt thanks.

We continue to have inspirational speakers each month one of whom was the head of Arohata Women's Prison. We donated bags filled with items that would be helpful to a women leaving prison. This initiative we are carrying forward into the next year.

David Dell, a composer, publisher, archivist,, historian and minister of religion entertained us with music from World War I. A very entertaining night and everyone enjoyed singing.

Our involvement in Oxted sale each year is a lot of fun and also raises a considerable amount of money for our charity fund.

Give a Smile Update - Wow! We have already operated on more than 100 children during the past twelve months, mostly to rectify their cleft lip/palate. It is such a joy to see lives changed radically after just 30 minutes in surgery and at the cost of only \$250.

Building "one block at a time" - Changing lives "one life at a time!"

We have some great news! We have started our new building!



Due to the generous support of individual donors and many people attending fundraising events over the past year, we have been able to start the build process.

The new building will house our boys that are aged 8 years and over. Our crisis/rescue home on the island of Romblon, is now at it's maximum occupancy, so it is necessary to transfer the children as soon as possible to our main home "Ruel House" in Calapan City.

These children come from physical and sexual abuse so it is not wise or appropriate to house the boys and girls in the same building.

Volunteers Extraordinaire

We have a lovely couple, Tim and Petrina Davison who have come from Tauranga, NZ to the Philippines, along with their two young children. They have committed to a year as "Orphanage Managers" and are also taking care of all the volunteers that come to help.



We have just celebrated our 12th Foundation Day Anniversary. It was great to celebrate all the good things that are happening at **Ruel Foundation-Give a Smile**. The staff and children at Ruel House, in Calapan City, all joined together to compete against each other with dramatic presentations. It was extremely powerful! We were brought to tears and laughter as the dramas portrayed everything that we do here.
