Kahui Ako-2019 has been a great year here at Porirua College. It has been a year of collaboration as we develop our ability to grow together, students and staff, PC and our Porirua East schools. The Kahui Ako of all the schools in the east. has been working on a new graduate profile, based on consultation with all our school communities. At PC, we consulted with you in 2018 and fed into the profile to

be launched in 2020. It describes the qualities we want to develop in our young people: Voice, Action and Identity.

At PC we have been working on developing those qualities through our Powerful Learner Matrix that is designed to grow student ownership of their learning. We have seen this strongly in the senior school with students developing learning plans resulting in fewer of them having to come back for credit catch up in mahi tahi.

MATTERING

In Term 3 over 800 audience members came from as far away as Dunedin, Christchurch, Wellington, and the Kapiti Coast to watch our Theatre Production "Mattering" written and researched by Delia Baskerville and directed by Karl Payne.

The play "Mattering" held the voices of real NZ students who are often forgotten and written off by schools, teachers, and politicians.

"Labels on their heads, labels on their hearts- they don't stand a chance- wherever does it start?"

Most importantly we all realised we were not doing this show for the applause or the credits- although all actors and technicians passed their NCEA assessments! We presented a piece of theatre we hoped got under your skin to get you thinking of why you or others skip school.

The production was in a stark Brechtian style of theatre which aims to get the audience thinking and analysing reality – in this case making the audience analyse the snapshots of truant behaviour and decide how they can themselves influence the issue of "wagging" that was being presented.

Two follow up hui were conducted to workshop how could we address the truancy issue in Porirua. This Porirua College performance was the premiere of this show. In the future Delia hopes to restage the show- it may be in Porirua or a different community wanting to address their own truancy issues.

Everyone worked really hard to make this show a success. Special mention to Mr Hoyes, Mrs Avia, Perry Piercy, Jan Bolton, John Topp, Lisi Hughes, Marlene Jackson and the staff of PC that came to watch and share. Thanks also to the parents that lent their children to us so they could shine in the show.

- All of them offer students fresh opportunities to learn in more dynamic and real world ways than in a traditional classroom setting.
- These classes will run for extended periods on Tuesdays and Thursday.

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THE COURSE	A BRIEF DESCRIPTION	
Beautiful You! (Year 9—11)	Explore your personal values and beliefs around self-image and beauty. Look at attitudes in society around us. The course also has a practical hands on component.	
Carving Course (Year 9—11)	In the Carving Course you will learn drawing skills, learn carving skills, learn key te reo carving words and their meanings.	
Climate Action (Year 11 & 12)	We have an emergency! It's time to get active and do something! You decide exactly what.	
Create a Comic (Year 9—12)	The course will touch on all the major aspects of drawing and creating comic books, while learning to use different drawing techniques.	
Computer Programming and Building (including networks) (Year 9—13)	Writing computer programmes, using spreadsheets, building a computer network.

Design and Build - Electric Bike (Year 11—13)	In this course you will be working in small groups to design and build an electric bike. You will be learning woodwork, metal work and some electronics. There will be an opportunity to enter your team's bike into a competition if you wish.	
Fa'asinoala (Wayfinder) (Year 9—13)	This is a course for English language learners that has a life skills/careers focus.

Life After School (Year 11 - 13)	What do you need to know for life after school: opening the doors to careers, managing money, looking after your health?
Measina Pasifika (Pacific Treasures) (Year 9 & 13)	Explore and discover Measina such as: history, dance, music, art, culture, language, oratory, comedy (faleaitu), tattooing, tapa/siapo making, weaving, handicrafts, traditional songs, myths, legends, Samoan building (eg canoes, houses), herbal healing, land and titles, & tattooists.
Mixologist- Barista (Year 13)	Learn how to make and serve coffee, juices and smoothies: create your own signature version of TANK juice. Create your own small company' with signage, menus and marketing. Provide awesome drinks for the community.
PC Legends (Year 12—13)	You will meet with ex PC students to photograph and document their success story. The artwork you create about these PC legends will decorate the school for years to come!
Police Studies Programme (Year 13)	In this course you will learn the skills and knowledge associated with policing. Explore the physical and leadership requirements of being a police officer in Aotearoa.
Porirua Creatives (Year 9,10, 13)	Choose what you might inquire about. Choose if you want to make a music video, a dance, publish poetry, or even run a concert with the DJ & lights showcasing your own original songs! Develop skills in the creative industries that might lead to career pathways.
Te Ao Māori (Year 9—13)	Mātauranga Māori is about a Māori way of being and engaging in the world based on ancient values of the spiritual realm of Te Ao Mārama (the cosmic family of the natural world). This learning journey starts with Rangi and Papatuanuku who are the creators of Te Ao te Maori. They had seven sons, and their stories will connect us to our culture, our identity and the land we stand on and stand at the heart of our learning activities.
Trailblaze Sport	This course aims to challenge you holistically and using a variety of fun and engaging learning activities. You are all leaders in your own way and we aim to bring that out and challenge you to go to the next level.
U-Choose	In this course you are the boss; you set the goals, choose the work, and are responsible for your learning. A proposal around your idea is expected prior to acceptance into this course for mentor allocation.
