On Monday, we collected

\$466 from 47 members and 0 guests – an average of \$10 per person – following Rhys Barlow's sergeant session on the prison system.

'Had we ever been inside a prison?', Rhys asked, and talked about visiting Alcatraz and meeting an 82-year-old author signing books who had spent almost his entire life in prison – from 16 to 80 years old.

We welcomed

No-one. Aside from our two speakers, no guests were at last Monday's meeting. Who might you bring to next Monday's meeting?

And the speaker at our last meeting was

The Chief Human Rights Commissioner, **David Rutherford**, spoke on Human Rights Challenges for New Zealand, traversing the areas of work, sport, school and our individual lives, expressing concern about the unacceptable and pervasive level of violence and bullying in New Zealand society.

He indicated that in the global context of governments retreating from human rights issues, corporate sector leaders are moving towards modelling respect and understanding in their corporate cultures – concepts that are core to societal change.

David reminded us that bullying and violence is everybody's business, regardless of where and to whom it happens. He was very clear that there is much we can do as individuals to effect change. What we hold in our hearts and minds matters. In particular, he asked: Are we prepared to consistently express our belief in inclusiveness? This, he feels, is how we will promote respect and understanding in New Zealand society. David left us with the sobering perspective of what is most heard from those bullied at school - 'No one stood up for me.'

If you sit with Hewitt Humphrey, ask him what he's doing in Rimutaka Prison • What's his role?

Visiting Justice (VJ), conducting disciplinary hearings when an inmate is charged with committing an offence in prison. If a not guilty plea is entered, the VJ hears the case which is put together by a prosecutor, with evidence from Corrections Officers who can be cross-examined by the accused. The VJ makes a decision based on the evidence presented. Hearings involve a mix of the

adversarial and inquisitorial systems. The VJ has the power to sentence prisoners to a combination of cell-confinement and/or loss of privileges, and sometimes loss of earnings.

What impresses him?

The efficiency of the prison system and that prisoner welfare and safety are taken very seriously.

· What surprises him?

Prisoners with apparently genial and friendly manners can turn out to be the most violent of inmates.

What worries him?

The destructive power and influence of gangs in the prison system.



Rotary beyond our club

The bell tolls for polio – Rotary Club of Sooke, British Columbia has a handbell that passes from club to club. The club holding the bell pays End Polio Now \$1 for every day it has the bell in their possession, so each club *has* to pass the bell on. The bell has so far raised \$3,000 and has travelled 19,000 miles, going as far as a club in Thailand when a Sooke club member visited his son.
