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

Entity Structure:

The organisation is governed by a committee comprising of a Chair, a Treasurer, a Secretary and other elected members. Committee members are elected at the Annual General Meeting and the Office Holders are elected at the following Committee meeting. Six of the Committee members are artist representatives who attend the organisation regularly. This is to ensure that the people who attend the organisation can have input into decision making processes and the planning of future direction. Other members from the wider community are elected based on their skills, experience or resources which will benefit the organisation. There are job descriptions for the community representatives and artist representatives and role descriptions for the Chair, the Treasurer and the Secretary.

Main Sources of the Entity's Cash and Resources:

Revenue from the Ministry of Social Development for service provision to 84 people with disabilities over 12 months. We have a grant from Wellington City Council for service provision to the Wellington community.

Entity's Reliance on Volunteers and Donated Goods or Services:

Apart from our Coordinator and staff team the organisation relies on gifts of volunteer time and expertise such as serving on the Committee, helping to arrange in-house and community events, and gallery exhibition openings. Other volunteer time includes widespread support in the art studios, recording of artist's stories, photographing events and technical assistance. One of our regular donors since 2007 has been the Empire Fergusson Masonic Lodge. They have made significant donations to be spent on equipment and essential art materials with funding that they have raised at annual fundraising events. We are incredibly grateful for their support.

Chair's Report

"An oasis of sanity where people can make art" was how one participant described Vincents Art Workshop at our Annual Planning Day this year. Echoed by all, a place where whanau, community, creativity and connection can flourish.

The past year saw a year of consolidation of relationships with funders, amongst staff and on the committee. Financial oversight has been

strengthened, especially important in view of increasing funding restraints and rising costs. The staff sub-committee has been revitalised, giving support to the Kaiwhakahaere, Andrew Mitchell, regarding staff conditions of employment, professional development and supervision. Work on policies (not the most exciting part of committee responsibilities but vital for robust accountability) has seen committed, thoughtful and spirited discussions, with artist representatives contributing their valuable perspectives.

Our Annual Planning Day was held in May when artists, staff, committee members and friends spent the day reviewing progress, and planning, scheming and dreaming. Five themes emerged as priorities for the coming year:

- * Staff wellbeing
- Support and care for the artists
- Promotion and fundraising
- Policies and processes
- ★ 40th anniversary celebrations in 2025

These will be developed and incorporated into our 3 year Plan, to provide a framework for the committee's work.

Sarah's Story

Sarah Porter first came to Vincents in the early 90s feeling lost and broken during a particularly difficult time for her. Sarah was warmly welcomed shown around, and invited to join in. She was astonished by the dazzling array of options and choices, and found the ability to use materials and tools without concern for the cost was incredibly liberating. Sarah stepped into a new identity as an artist which itself was refreshing and uplifting.

After attending Vincents Art Workshop regularly for several months, Sarah was offered a role as a casual tutor. In addition she took on the role of cleaner. In 1995, Sarah began in the position of administrator, also contributing to the committee for 6 years.

The process of art making enabled Sarah to process and heal from some unspeakable and traumatic early life events. Ultimately this was significantly more helpful than clinical mental health services had been. Vincents proved to be incredibly healing on many levels. The improved wellbeing and the skills developed in the melting pot of the studio opened the door to a rewarding career enabling her work in mental health.

Seven years ago Sarah undertook some leadership training, in which one of the exercises led to the recognition that Vincents had been a profound turning point in her life. Shortly afterwards a chance meeting with the then Chair prompted Sarah to return to the committee to give back to Vincents. Sarah spent another 6 years on the committee with 18 months as Chairperson, shepherding the organisation through troubled times.

Our thanks to Sarah for her contributions, her thoughtfulness and gentleness, and her story.

A Visitor's Perspective

At Vincents we love to show off our incredible space, the amazing artists and talent that make up our community. One of our community committee representatives, Susan, took a friend to Vincents and this was their feedback:

"As a visiting American, I had the good fortune to discover Vincents. I am a retired educator from public schools in NYC, NY and San Francisco, CA. During my career, I have been an art teacher, special education teacher and school administrator in the public schools and non-profit treatment centers for children at risk.

Since retiring from full time employment at a school site, I have been coaching teachers, administrators and school superintendents in arts integration and integrated learning both in teaching and school leadership.

This short introduction will hopefully communicate that my thoughts on Vincent's come from a vast and somewhat very connected experience in both the arts and developmental disabilities.

I accompanied a dear friend to Vincent's as she is a community representative on the governance board and was amazed by what I saw.

I am not aware of any agency in the US, although there may be, that offers free, open studio art experiences for folks in all walks of life, with or without disabilities of any kind.

The magnitude of societal inclusion by way of an open art space for all cannot be underestimated.

A free studio space, with materialsphenomenal!

I am aware of studio situations in the US, a few excellent ones right here in the bay area of California, but none are integrated; they are for the developmentally disabled only. So, while they are a great safe haven for the artists, they remain isolated by way of their disability, not integrated as in Vincent's.

I was so impressed I had my friend take me back so I could spend some time in the studio making art and visiting with the other artists. An altogether lovely couple of hours.

If I lived in New Zealand, I would be a regular practicing artist at the studio as well as offer my services in both teaching and leadership as needed.





Service Performance Report

Description of the Entity's Outcomes:

Vincents Art Workshop provides weekly tutored art workshops and general studio hours, art materials and opportunities for participation in a variety of art forms free of charge. Vincents has a policy of open access and community integration and all people are welcome. Vincents believes in the creativity in everyone.

Vincents works to:

Provide a safe, supportive and purposeful environment

Provide personal, cultural and creative support in response to the needs of the individual Reduce the stigma attached to mental illness

Provi<mark>de regular</mark> opportunities for participants' involvement in the running of the workshop Ensure the workshop makes time available for women participants only with a programme informed by women's needs

Ensure Māori participants have specific input into programmes and operation

Ensure the workshop is accessible to people with disabilities.

Our mission/vision statement is: Changing Lives Through Art

In the year ended June 2024 we had a total of 469 artists attend Vincents. The main ethnicities recorded were Pakeha / NZ European at 60%, Asian at 15% and Māori at 9% (an increase from 7% last year). People came from 51 different suburbs all over Wellington, Porirua and the Hutt Valley to attend the studio. The central city was most represented with Te Aro at 22%. Newtown was the next highest suburb at 7% of attendees. Young people make up a large part of the Vincents community, with 55% of our artists being under the age of 30. We are also a popular place for older persons, with 10% of our artists being over the age of 60. The gender makeup of our artists is 66% Female, 20% Male and 13% Other (an increase from 8% last year). We have noticed a significant increase in referrals to our service from other organisations over the last year, including Maranga, HELP, Wesley Community Action, Evaro, IDEA Services, Spectrum Care, Community Connections, Vincentian Home, Emerge, Onslow College, Rongotai College, and ongoing referrals from Te Whare o Matairangi due to our weekly outreach at the ward.

Coordinator/Kaiwhakahaere Report



Andrew Mitchell

The 2023 – 2024 year has been of change and renewal for Vincents.

Wellington's CBD community has seen many changes, including local businesses feeling the pinch from the reduced number of public servants coming into the city, major earthquake strengthening works, and important arts establishments announcing closures. Many of our artists face financial and other pressures which have caused anxiety. In the face of all of this, Vincents has remained a shining light and a hub where people can create and build community. I would like to thank one of our two major funders, Wellington City Council, for offering us a further one-year contract funding grant, continuing to support our contribution to making the central city a safe and welcoming place to be.

Much of my effort in my first year as Coordinator has been put towards strengthening relationships with our key stakeholders. My aim is to continue to build a solid platform on which we can attract new grants and donations to support the amazing work that is achieved at Vincents every day.

After much consideration, in October last year we decided to trial a new schedule, reducing our opening hours by closing on Saturdays. This decision took into account our ongoing funding, our staffing resources, health and safety requirements, and feedback received from our artist community. We want to continue to provide a high quality service to the community of Wellington and stay true to our kaupapa of providing a place to create for those who would otherwise not have the opportunity. We want to do this while remaining financially viable so we can continue to 'Change Lives Through Art' into the future.

We have made significant progress towards our three-year plan which was developed at our annual planning day in May last year:

Goal One: An inclusive, safe and positive art space, contributing to social wellbeing.

Goal Two: Provide art programmes, tutoring and exhibitions that are accessible to all.

Goal Three: Sustainable, transparent, compliant with legislation, and financially viable.

A major success has been receiving confirmation of an Innovation Grant from our largest funder, Ministry of Social Development. Over the next year we will use this grant to develop a 'Vincents App'. The app will streamline our data collection and reporting, and also give artists access to create a record of work and provide ongoing feedback regarding the service. MSD has also confirmed 3 further years of funding for Vincents until June 2027.

We have continued to review our governance and operating structures. Our committee is now provided with a comprehensive financial report each month, including a 3-month cashflow forecast so members can have a more accurate overview of our ongoing financial position, and assist any fundraising efforts. We have also developed a Client-centered Services Policy and a Governance Policy. We hope that these policies will help to inform changes to other policies that the committee are reviewing at each monthly meeting.

Investing in training our staff team has been another focus. We have reinstated monthly professional supervision for staff, and I am completing a series of 5 one-on-one sustainable funding training sessions with Megan Thorn from Exult, funded by Arts Access Aotearoa.

Our Head Tutor, Deborah, and myself attended a Cultural Comfortability hui with Marty and Marilyn Vreede, exploring the importance of whakawhanaungatanga and karakia. Karakia are now used at all artist meetings, staff meetings and committee meetings at Vincents. We also attended a training run by Inside Out, where we looked at practical ways that our professional practice, and workplace, can be an inclusive and safe place for those in rainbow & takatāpui communities.

We have sought professional input into our communications from two people working in this field. James Macleod is looking at our mission statement, values, and how we write our funding applications, to develop a consistent narrative. Bryan Simpson has started a project to interview some of our artists, with an aim of having written and video biographies published on our website and social media to help tell the stories of how Vincents impacts our artists' lives.

Thanks to our wonderful staff team who put a huge amount of love and effort into making the studio a warm and positive place to be. Cost-of-living pressures have affected everyone, and I thank you for your

commitment to Vincents over the past year.

Thanks to all of our committee and other volunteers, and financial supporters, including our Friends of Vincents, and our patrons Dame Suzanne Snively and Howard Fancy, who all help to keep the organisation operational.

Thanks to our treasurer Richard Gawith, secretary EJ Gee, and bookkeeper Billie-Joe Hunter, for your hard work towards this annual report, and to our administrator Sarah Morris for compiling the user statistics.

Thanks to our chair, Bryony Hales, for your passionate ongoing support of Vincents, and particular thanks to new committee member Robyn Smith for your significant work on reviewing and updating our policies, and the HR experience she has brought to the role.

Thanks also to deputy chair, Susan Gordon, and community rep Debbie Godwin, for their wisdom and support of Vincents. Also, to the artist reps, thanks for bringing your unique perspectives to the table.

Special thanks must also be given to Richard Benge and the rest of the Arts Access Aotearoa team for their ongoing support and advocacy for the Creative Spaces Network.

As we prepare for our 40th Anniversary celebrations starting March 2025, we have started sorting through Vincents' archives. It is clear to me that although we have evolved, our kaupapa has remained consistent through many changes over the years. I am looking forward to seeing what the next 40 years holds for Vincents!

In the last year we have had 11 exhibitions at our onsite gallery, including 4 solo shows, two Matariki shows, and a ceramics show. We held our Annual Group Exhibition at Vincents Gallery from 11 October – 1 November, with over 60 guests attending the opening. We

Tuesday Workshops

In October 2023 we re-introduced some Tuesday workshops as part of our new schedule. Once a month, we had a tutored workshop bookings for up to 12 people. The classes that we held were: Clay Sculpture with Dani, Woodblock Printing on Fabric with Anna, Zines with Aimee, Driftwood Mobiles with Anastasia, Still Life Drawing with Blake, Art Books with Sam Duckor-Jones, Making Jewellery with Anna, Wire Portraits with Nina, and Slow Stitching with Anna.

On the Tuesdays when these workshops are not operating, we offered 'Mini Workshops' in the main studio for those who want to join, which were mostly run by our tutor Nina. During the Tuesday Workshops and Mini Workshops, we had an area set aside in the main studio for those wanting to work on their own projects.

At the start of this year we welcomed renowned artist Steve Gibbs to Vincents to present a talk called 'Ata Tuhi - The art of light and shadows'. The presentation covered Steve's work in the context of a history of Māori artists who have used relief carving techniques in their work. Steve was invited to Vincents by our Head Tutor, Deborah, who was a student of his at Toihoukura - School of Māori Visual Art.

Community Events

Artists also had the opportunity to participate in our Lunar New Year project where we created a huge dragon mural for the Newtown Festival (funded by a grant from Wellington City Creative Communities). Each piece of the dragon was painted by a different artist, and we installed our Dragon at the playground in Newtown. We also had a stall at the festival, which we used to promote Vincents' mahi, and sell ceramics, cards, brooches and fabric crafts made by our artists.

Artists Emma Gregory and Sarah Straker entered the IHC Art Awards 2023. Our administrator Sarah took them on a field trip to see their work exhibited. Emma was very excited to have sold her artwork.

Te Whare o Matairangi

We have continued with the provision of weekly art focus activities in the psychiatric unit at Wellington Hospital. This 'outreach' service has been operating since 2010 and provides a valuable link between the psychiatric unit and Vincents when patients from the ward return to the community. Our tutor Nina has been instrumental in this work, and assists those who have come to Vincents after being discharged. We have been in recent talks with the OT staff at the ward, who are keen to see this referral process streamlined. Nina and Andrew attended a Matariki event in June, enjoying a delicious hangi prepared by the staff to say thanks to contractors who run programmes in the ward.

Equipment Donations

November saw the delivery of our new etching press, part of last year's donation from Empire Fergusson Lodge. This was a major purchase, and we are hoping that the press will mean more artists using this medium, and that it might attract some guest artists to hold workshops in the studio. Other big-ticket items that were purchased as part of this donation were a wood bandsaw, and the installation of an extraction hood which has greatly improved the health and safety of the workshop.



Online presence

We have continued to be active on social media, mostly through Facebook but also Instagram. Our Facebook page now has over 2,600 followers with over 1,000 living in Wellington. Our posts reach over 5,000 people per month. We have the Vincents Artist Group on Facebook which now has 367 members.

There are around 2,500 views of our Google business profile each month. Our website is connected to a network of other community-based websites and Arts Access Aotearoa's site. We use this platform to advertise exhibitions and other news and events at Vincents.

Our YouTube channel now has 391 subscribers and has had almost 7,500 views in the last year.

We are in the process of reviewing our online profile, with the hope of attracting more

individual sponsors. Ayesha Shafi (volunteer through Community Comms Collective) has submitted a usability report about Vincents' website, and our website host Flightdec has since made some changes to the website menu and homepage. Further changes will be needed to respond to the suggested changes in the report.

Other happenings

Head Tutor Deborah showed a presentation by Māori scholar Dr Rangi Matamua about Matariki, to help provide some context and inspiration for artists working towards our June exhibition at Vincents Gallery. She also organised a pot-luck lunch to celebrate the Māori new year.

We had a couple of collaborations with other organisations. The first was an exhibition at Vincents Gallery showcasing over 30 artworks created by Maranga artists, who also attend Vincents each week. 'Made by Maranga' is a brand created by young adults with intellectual disabilities, based in Wellington CBD. As a creative disability collective they hope to showcase their talents and reduce prejudice towards people living with disabilities, and celebrate their uniqueness and authenticity. The opening event on Tuesday 8th August was a big hit and featured performances by the Maranga band 'Big Rock', and Maranga Musical Theatre Group performing songs from Grease and Mamma Mia.

The second collaboration was a pop-up exhibition at Petone Depot organised by our tutors Dani and Anna. We displayed artworks which had been donated by Vincents artists. The exhibition ran throughout August and was an opportunity to connect with another community space, and to promote the work of Vincents to the Lower Hutt public.

We have also had a noticeable increase in attendance at our weekly Life Drawing sessions.

Despite the changes to our staff team, and the reduction in our opening hours, the studio has continued to be a busy place to be with many exciting things happening each month. Many thanks to all of the artists who attend the studio regularly, making amazing artworks, and building community with each other. Vincents wouldn't be the wonderful place that it is without your passion for creativity, and your willingness to exhibit your work in our gallery, as part of the wider Wellington arts scene.



Ash's Story



Ash Gibson (Ngāpuhi, Ngāti Porou)

Interviewed by Bryan Simpson

I've been coming to Vincents since I arrived in Wellington in 2022. I come every day and I feel very thankful to have found Vincents.

Before coming to Wellington I moved around a lot. I've found it hard to find work and to fit in to 'normal' society. My parents passed away some time ago and I'm estranged from most of my extended whanau. But I feel like I've found my whanau at Vincents.

I grew up an only child and while my parents were loving I often felt unseen and unheard. For people like me who don't have great social skills, Vincents is a uniquely inclusive place where you can be who you are. I've lived in many places and never found anything like it. If it wasn't here I don't know what I'd do. I know many others feel like that too.

Art is a very healing thing. It's hard to explain but it's a way to express your feelings and whatever's going on inside you and help you deal with that. Being in a place like Vincents is really helpful for mental health issues, depression, loneliness, and trauma. In the past I haven't felt like I had much community or whanau support, but I've found that at Vincents. Coming here makes me feel less lonely and less depressed. It gives me a reason

to get out of the house and be productive.

I've been looking for something like Vincents for a long time, and to have finally found it has been life-changing. It's become my new found whanau. All of us come for different reasons, whether it's to make art or craft or just feel part of a community. Like any whanau, we all have our differences but we can also be ourselves here, doing our own thing and also creating amazing art together.

I've always been interested in art but I've never really had the support to pursue it. Vincents has been amazing. It's not just being able learn new skills like pottery or jewellery-making, and access materials and resources that I'd never have been able to afford on a benefit. It's also the opportunity to get feedback and inspiration, and to display my work through exhibitions and social media. That's given me huge motivation to continue and keep developing, as an artist and as a person.

So has the encouragement from tutors and staff members. Being able to tap into all their experience and knowledge is incredible. Their enthusiasm for us and for our art is really uplifting and affirming.

I've developed a lot of other transferable skills since I've been coming here. For example, helping with curating exhibitions, helping other artists, learning how to use equipment such as power saws for working with wood, building connections with the Wellington artistic community, and becoming more confident in dealing with people.

Plus it's improved my physical health. I walk here and when I first started coming I really struggled—I had to stop and catch my breath every few minutes. Now it's easy.

These are all (literally!) small steps but they're all moving me in the right direction.

Before I found Vincents I was very transient and getting down on life. Now, I have a purpose and goals for the future.

I want to stay involved with art and I would like to be a selling artist. I want to be able to pay for my rent, my bread and butter, and do a little extra. But I also know that there are lots of options. For example, having helped curate exhibitions I'm interested in working in an art gallery or even having my own gallery one day. Or building on my experience helping other people and possibly becoming an art tutor. Being at Vincents has helped make all those things possible.

I feel like I'm in the place where I need to be, at last. I didn't get the chance to follow my passion when I was younger, but I also know

that it's never too late and this is my time now.

I've been lucky to get some great feedback from people who have adopted pieces of my art. For example, someone who has a piece of mine in her art collection asked her children (3 of whom are artists themselves) which pieces they'd like to keep when she'd 'moved on' – and they chose mine. It's amazing for me to get that validation from 'real' artists.

Someone else told me they looked at a ceramic piece of mine when they walked out their door every day because it makes them feel happy. That's such a wonderful thing to hear, and to know I can make a difference.

I'm so grateful to Vincents for helping me follow my passion, and live my purpose.


