Kamau Holland, Kaiarahi (Director) Catholic Social Services

Lizzie Wootton (upper photo); Kate Sanders O'Connor (lower photo) - Hospital Chaplains, Wellington Hospital. We provide a ministry of presence for patients, whānau and staff at the hospital.



This spiritual pastoral care work is varied, depending on what people identify they need; for example, someone to listen, to pray, to laugh. We honour each person whatever they are experiencing, we have time to sit with and accompany, witness to their questions, pain, hope and faith, provide access to the Sacraments, prayer, and pastoral care for patients at the end of life, and their families. We visit across the hospital in all wards, including mental health, bearing witness to God's healing, whether spoken or unspoken. It is a privilege to respect the spirituality of people in times of vulnerability.



Kathryn van Woerkom, Hospital Chaplain, Hutt Hospital. As a hospital chaplain I have the privilege to provide support, a listening ear, a comforting presence, prayer and unconditional love and acceptance to all patients, their whānau and the hospital staff. I bring Holy Communion, can accompany patients at the end of life and organise a visit from the priests and other ministers when requested. I am also involved with many projects at the hospital which help to make living with illness and dying more comfortable for all involved.



Marie Paurini. Kia ora. My name Is Marie and I am the Kenepuru Hōhipera Chaplain. It is a privilege and honour to walk alongside our patients, their whānau and all of the amazing staff at Kenepuru. Blessings of Aroha and Light to you all.



Falefou Sio, Prison Chaplain at Arohata and Rimutaka Prisons. Falefou's role is to provide prison ministry services in accordance with the teachings of the Catholic Church by serving persons in prison, to promote and share the Gospel message of Christ's salvation, provide opportunities to celebrate the Sacraments and to provide pastoral care, counsel and support.



Paul Alsford, Community Facilitator. Paul took up his role in 2019 and has led some key projects: Benefit Impacts, ongoing Refugee Resettlement, Afghan emergency evacuee response and CSS Befriender Volunteers programme. He has built connections and partnerships within parishes to safely work with and advocate for the poor and vulnerable, and respond to poverty through projects and partnerships in their wider community.



Lyneen joined CSS as a Navigator in May 2022. Lyneen will work with our Community Facilitator and Social Worker. Lyneen comes from a background in education and mental health work, within the disability sector. She is Deaf and speaks fluent NZ Sign Language and vocal English. We are delighted to have Lyneen as part of our team.



Katrin Eickhorst has been Trainer/Coordinator Seasons for Growth of the Archdiocese of Wellington since 2019 and is based at CSS. Seasons for Growth is an educational ministry supporting people through grief, loss and change and has been available in New Zealand for over 20 years. Our Clergy and COVID-19

During this unpredictable time of COVID and long periods of lockdowns, we've all had many mixed feelings. Isolation, loneliness, depression and fear have had us in its grip. 'Normal' daily routines were no longer. The same was true for our clergy. Like us, they were forced to adapt and adjust. Gatherings of any description were suspended. Funerals were conducted with only a priest and funeral director in attendance. Hospital and rest home visits were 'out'; Zoom meetings, mask wearing and hand sanitizers were 'in'.

Their ministry entered a new phase where innovative ways to continue meeting their communities' needs became the norm and at times, a struggle.

They had to juggle what was right for their own health and welfare and that of their community.

Their understanding of these needs with guidelines from the Archdiocese and Government, meant they were able to offer reassurance to their communities when called upon to do so.
